## PARTS OF SPEECH REVIEW: SINGULAR AND PLURAL NOUNS



A **noun** is a word that names a person, place, thing, or idea.

<b>Singular nouns</b> refer to a <i>single</i> person, place, thing, or idea.	Examples: doctor, city, bus
<b>Plural nouns</b> refer to <i>multiple</i> people, places, things, or ideas. They usually end in -s, -ies, or -es.	<b>Examples:</b> doctors, cities, buses

Irregular plural nouns don't follow the rules, so you need to memorize the exceptions.
